With her potential and ambition, Tolu has been accepted into the University of Texas Dallas, where she will commence her undergraduate journey majoring in Computer Science in the forthcoming fall of 2023. Her remarkable story exemplifies the transformative power of GIGH and its ability to propel young women towards unexpected yet prosperous paths, solidifying Tolu's status as a beacon of inspiration for generations to come.

Programming

What We Do & How We Do It...

Girls Inc. of Greater Houston equips local girls ages 6 to 18 to navigate gender, social, and economic barriers through our comprehensive programs on topics including bullying, healthy body image, social media and financial literacy, STE²M (science, technology, engineering, entrepreneurship and math), and leadership skills. We provide this enrichment programming in two ways:

Enrichment programs in local schools and community centers targets the highest need communities (69% family household income of <\$30K/yr.). Trained facilitators work with school/community partners to determine the subject matter that best meets the needs of the girls and designs an inquiry-based, hands-on learning experience for the students. Girls Inc. of Greater Houston is currently in 36 sites and served 1,706 girls in 2021.

Spring Break and Summer Day Camps provides hands on learning environment for girls 7-12 (Camp Smart) exposing them to STEM, careers in STEM field; and other Social Emotional Learning activities. For girls 13-18 (Be BOLD Institute), provides interactive activities that prepare them for life after high school, leadership skills, college preparedness, career development, and community engagement.




